Regulation relevant to alien species - Ireland (IE)

The Republic of Ireland does not currently have a single guiding policy for IAS and does not have any pieces of legislation dedicated to invasive species. The provisions for management of invasive species are divided between several different Acts that are focused on different policy areas with relevance to the problem. For example, the Irish Fisheries (Consolidation) Acts 1959 regulate fisheries and the import and sale of fish species, and the Noxious Weeds Act 1936 applies to the removal of such weeds only. The Irish National Biodiversity Plan is at present the only policy that includes actions specifically focused on the control of invasive species.

Strong cooperation is in place regarding the issue of IAS with Northern Ireland and for instance the website www.invasivespeciesireland.com is a cooperation between Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.
